The main thing the Christian Church has to offer the world in a crisis is hope. I don't mean the sort of "It'll be alright on the night" sort of hope or even the sort of sunny optimism that some people seem to be able to maintain however bad things get: this is the sort of hope based on a fundamental belief in the goodness of God and the goodness of people and a trust that ultimately the future is not purely a matter of chance.

In the letter to the Romans, part of which is set for today, Paul describes this hope in almost painful terms: it's a yearning, a straining, a standing on tiptoe, reaching. Knowing who we are, we long to see the fulfilment of the promise in the here and now while at the same time knowing that there will always be a future dimension to it. Hope can be painful but life without hope would be bleak indeed.

"Now hope that is seen is not hope, for who hopes for what he sees? Yet if we hope for what we do not see we wait for it with patience." We are not necessarily optimists but we are fundamentally hopeful because beyond what can be seen we look to what cannot yet be seen. That is what we offer to a world in crisis: we are people of hope.
